



KEYWORTH BARN

Following the recent Public Inquiry, the Secretary of State has ruled that Keyworth Barn cannot be demolished and the Trust is now entering into discussions with the other interested parties including the owner, the Notts. County Council, and the Rushcliffe Borough Council to discuss the financial and other measures which are now necessary. The immediate problem is to find a practical use for the barn and discussions towards this end are taking place as a matter of urgency.

THE GUIDE HOUSE (LODGE FARM), MANSFIELD ROAD, ARNOLD

Following the recent Public Inquiry, the Secretary of State has also ruled that the Guide House cannot be demolished. At the request of Gedling Borough Council the Trust has expressed a willingness to meet the cost of a technical survey and a feasibility study. As with Keyworth Barn, the immediate problem will be to find a practicable use for this most important and interesting building and one of the objects of the feasibility study will be to ascertain possible alternative uses for the building including, for example, its conversion into dwellings or its adaptation to office use.

THE OLD WHITE HART, NEWARK

The Trust understands that the Nottinghamshire County Council has abandoned the idea of purchasing the Old White Hart, Newark, and converting it into a public library. However, several alternative purchasers have expressed an interest in this building and the Newark District Council has now served a repairs notice upon the owners. The District Council are hopeful that at least one of the possible alternative purchasers will carry out the terms of the repairs notice and has given an undertaking that the Trust will be kept closely informed of future developments.

WINDLES SQUARE, CALVERTON

Members of the Trust will be aware that during 1975 the restoration of the Windles Square cottages at Calverton was awarded a Meritage Year Amend by the Civic Trust in connection with the celebration of European Architectural Heritage Year.
