ANNUAL REPORT

The Council of the Trust delegates much of its responsibility to a Finance and Grants Sub-Committee which has met frequently during the year to consider applications for grants, the operation of the Trust through its Revolving Fund, the reports by Technical Advisers, and other matters concerning the protection of buildings of architectural and historic quality. All these functions deserve some amplification as the work accomplished during the year has been very extensive.

The grant policy of the Trust has remained the same despite the growth of other commitments, as the Trust has felt that one way in which it can best help to preserve quality buildings is by giving small grants to owners to help them with the extra costs that are involved because a building needs to be treated in a particular way. It is no part of the Trust's policy to help owners with the normal costs of maintenance, but to give some small acknowledgment of the increased cost because of the use of appropriate materials.

Grants have been made or offered during the financial year 1972/3 for work at the following properties:

Members of the Trust had the opportunity, at the Annual General Meeting in November, of seeing a detailed report and description of the work being accomplished, when the Trust's Honorary Technical Advisers showed slides of buildings with which the Trust had been concerned, and a further opportunity was given in the Tour that was arranged on 13th July (and to be repeated in 1973) when members visited properties in Southwell and Newark and district.

Apart from the advice of the Honorary Technical Advisers in relation to grant applications, the Trust relies heavily upon its Advisers for their expertise in dealing with the applications for 'listed' building consent, or for alterations to buildings within Conservation Areas. The number of visits and full reports prepared by the two Architect members of the Advisory Panel has totalled two hundred and ninety six in the year under review. The cold statement of the number of visits cannot reflect adequately the Trust's gratitude to Mr. Johnson and Dr. Summers for all their services, voluntarily given to the Trust. Other members of the Advisory Panel are not involved so heavily in this work, but we extend our thanks, also, to Mr. Burrows, our Honorary Quantity Surveyor, and to Professor Dix, our planning expert, for the help that they have so readily given.

The Revolving Fund which the Trust decided to operate, following the inspiration by the National Trust for Scotland Little Houses Scheme, has got off to a good start and the Grey House at Carlton-on-Trent, which was purchased by the Trust in order to save it from demolition or further decay, has now been resold, with plans for its renovation which will take place at an early date.

The Windles Square properties at Calverton will continue to be occupied by existing tenants, and the restoration scheme prepared by the University of Nottingham Teaching Office will be put into effect during 1973.

Similarly, other properties at Rempstone, which have been a generous gift to the Trust by Mr. Philip Derbyshire, are to be renovated, and the interests of existing tenants will be safeguarded.

The Trust has also purchased, with the aid of an interest free loan from the Southwell Rural District Council, properties at Westhorpe, Southwell, which are also the subject of a scheme of renovation.

The Bede House Chapel at Newark, which was bought by the Trust, is currently being considered by two potential users, and the grounds around it have already been effectively landscaped with the aid of grant from the County Council.

The Trust has considered the purchase of other properties and hopes that as the Revolving Fund comes into effective operation it will be possible to rescue more buildings which would otherwise be 'at risk'.

Whilst the Trust was originally set up to deal with buildings of 'domestic' scale, there have been some significant buildings in Nottinghamshire with which we have had to deal, and some of these have even qualified for grant because of the outstanding architectural or historic significance that they held for the County. Other large properties have also been reported on by the Trust, and whilst some, including, regrettably, Sherwood Lodge, are to disappear, others, like Annesley Hall and the Papplewick and Bestwood Pumping Stations, may well be saved to live a new and useful life, given new usages. Some other important buildings, including Winkburn Hall, Winthorpe Hall, Worksop Manor Lodge, and the Old White Hart at Newark, have also been the subject of some concern, and the future of some, at least, can be viewed with guarded optimism.

Following the success of the Trust in obtaining an assurance from the Department of the Environment that whatever line for the A46 was chosen, it would not involve the widening of Millgate and Castlegate through Newark, we have now held discussions with the Department of the Environment and the Midlands Road Unit concerning the alternatives that may be open, and are glad to commend both the Department of the Environment and the Local Authority on the implementation of a Town Scheme for Newark which should result in the renovation of many worthwhile buildings in that most important town.

Comments have also been made on the Town Plans produced for Southwell and Retford, and we look forward to co-operating with the Planning Department and the new District Councils in connection with the enhancement of both towns and villages. Particularly important in this respect is the new opportunity afforded by European Architectural Heritage Year 1975, and it is hoped that projects started during the next few months can be considered for Awards under the impetus given by this new plan.

We have been glad that since the Trust was set up, the climate of opinion towards conservation and preservation has warmed, and we are glad to report that although our membership list is small, it is steadily increasing. There will be fewer Local Authorites involved in our work from 1974 simply because there will be fewer of them, but we hope that their involvement, both financially and in the interest they express in conservation, will improve. We have, very largely, looked to the Local Authorities for support with this work in view of obligation placed upon them by Parliament to give consideration to the architectural and historic quality of buildings within their area. We would not expect that the contribution which Local Authorities give to the Trust should be their total commitment, but it should be sufficient to permit the operation of an independent and efficient assessment of where finance may best be applied to produce the result of saving important buildings and to enable action by the Trust itself in experimental schemes. Local Authorities will only be impressed to do this as the support that the Trust can command from voluntary sources grows to indicate the importance of its work.
