## ANNUAL REPORT

### INTRODUCTION

The year covered by this Annual Report has been a blend of ongoing work such as the provision of grant aid together with the development of some new initiatives and ideas.

Mr. J. A. Severn was appointed from the 1st April as part-time Technical Adviser and his appointment brings additional experience and resources to the Trust. Much of the work undertaken in the course of the year would have been impossible without his appointment which has already made a substantial mark upon the Trust; our thanks are due to him for his loyalty and hard work during the year. Mrs. I. M. Skirving felt unable to continue as Chairman of the Trust and Professor M. W. Barley was duly appointed; Mrs. Skirving became Vice-Chairman of the Trust and so is still able to support us in this capacity.

Dr. R. Middleton took over from Mr. J. R. Hammond as Secretary of both the Community Council and the Trust. In the interim period during which the Trust was without a formal Secretary Mr. J. A. Severn and Miss M. A. Barron undertook a considerable amount of work on behalf of the Trust and our grateful thanks are due to them.

### MEETINGS FOR MEMBERS



Warsop Parish Centre—Barn Conversion, November, 1977. The Trust grant aided the sympathetic conversion of this building from a barn to a Parish Hall and has since had the pleasure of holding its Annual General Meeting in this delightful building.

The 1977 Annual General Meeting of the Trust was held in the Tudor Barn of the Parish Centre, Warsop, on 24th October. After the formal business of the meeting there was an opportunity for members to meet informally over wine and cheese, and to see slides illustrating the work of the Trust in the previous year. The slides were, however, presented in the form of a quiz and members attending were divided into Gentlemen v Players (i.e. those professionally involved in planning or architecture). After a close-fought and entertaining contest the Players emerged triumphant.

The Spring Meeting was held in the auditorium of the County Library, Angel Row, Nottingham on Wednesday, 15th June. The meeting was addressed by Mr. Kit Martin who spoke on the Conservation of Historic Buildings and dealt specifically with the conversion of old buildings such as mills and barns to other uses mainly residential.

Two coach tours were arranged for members. The first of these visited the Orton Trust where an old church has been converted as a training centre for stonemasons. The afternoon provided an opportunity to see examples of Mr. Kit Martin's work, notably the Watermill at Wadenhoe and Dingley Hall which was in the process of conversion into smaller dwelling units. The second tour, which proved so popular that two coaches had to be hired, took members to see the Avoncroft Museum where restored and reconstructed buildings including a post mill, mediaeval town house and cruck-framed barn could be seen. During the afternoon Chester House, a mediaeval timber-framed building was visited and a conducted tour was given by courtesy of Mr. F. W. B. Charles.

A cold January evening was enlivened by a punch and paté party at Langar Hall by the kind permission of Mrs. I. M. Skirving. The event was arranged as a joint fund-raising exercise between the Trust and the Community Council for Nottinghamshire. A profit of £187 was made on the evening which was a most enjoyable occasion. Our thanks are due to Mrs. Skirving for her hard work in support of the evening.

## **PUBLIC INQUIRIES AND LISTED BUILDINGS**

The Trust has been represented at a number of public inquiries during the course of the year. Perhaps the saddest decision was the loss of the Guide House at Arnold where Listed Building Consent for demolition was granted. The outcome was in some ways no surprise but there are certainly lessons to be gained from it. The Guide House had been a problem for many years and the situation had dragged on with restoration becoming less and less feasible as time passed. This underlines the need for prompt action at the earliest possible opportunity. With this in mind the Trust will be compiling a list of buildings at risk which it will publicise from time to time. Not all decisions were so unfavourable: for example the Maltings at Mansfield was saved from demolition and a new use is now being sought for this fascinating building. There have been many successful conversions of such buildings in other parts of the country and it is hoped that some imaginative use will also be made of the Maltings.

### **Bede House Chapel**

Planning permission for the erection of old people's dwellings on the site adjacent to the Chapel has been obtained and negotiations are proceeding with a builder for the sale of the plot and a favourable outcome is anticipated. It is then intended to offer the Chapel itself to Newark District Council who would be responsible for its future upkeep.

### **The Barn, Market Warsop**

This listed building was demolished without the necessary consent. No action was taken against the owner as the demolition occurred in the interval between the Department of the Environment listing the building and the owner being formally notified. It is greatly regretted that a decision to protect the building should be nullified in this way. It is not commonly realised that demolition of a listed building without consent is a criminal offence with severe penalties including the possibility of imprisonment.

### **The Gables, Little Carlton**

This building illustrates the problems that face the restoration of many worthwhile buildings. Restoration would be expensive and may not be strictly economic in the generally accepted sense. However, various possibilities have been reviewed and it is hoped that a satisfactory outcome may be obtained.

### **Linby Lane, Papplewick**

The site contains a house and a range of barns built in magnesium limestone. The complex makes an important visual contribution to the approach to Papplewick. The Trust is in discussion with Gedling Borough Council about ways to save these fine buildings and plans for possible conversions have been drawn up.

### **Keyworth Barn**

The Barn is being restored with the County Council, Rushcliffe Borough Council and the Trust each making a major contribution towards the cost of restoration. The Trust's contribution will amount to some £6,000. It is very pleasing to be able to report a favourable outcome which safeguards this important building for future generations.

### **Windles Square, Calverton**

The Trust has been negotiating with a prospective purchaser for sale of the whole site fronting Orchard Drive at Calverton for the erection of one dwelling-house to a design prepared by the Teaching Office of the University of Nottingham, Department of Architecture. It is anticipated that negotiations will be satisfactorily completed in the near future. The Trust wishes to place on record its grateful thanks to Mr. David Bowler for the very considerable amount of time and effort that he has put into the project.

## FARM BUILDINGS SURVEY

The Trust submitted an application under the Job Creation Programme to employ suitably qualified graduates to undertake a survey of farm buildings in the County. Concern was felt that many of these buildings were now no longer required for their original purposes and were therefore likely to fall into disrepair. It was hoped that following the identification of these buildings they would be either suitable for conversion into housing accommodation or small workshops both of which could be undertaken in such a manner as to preserve their character. Regrettably the application was turned down by the Manpower Services Commission but the feasibility of undertaking the study either using voluntary assistance or under the new Manpower Service Commission programmes is currently being investigated. The results of such a survey, together with the information obtained on buildings at risk, would provide much useful information on the types of buildings particularly under threat in the County and the scale of the problem.
