Independent examiner's report to the trustees of Nottinghamshire Building Preservation Trust Limited ('the Company')

I report to the charity trustees on my examination of the accounts of the company for the year ended 31 March 2023.

Responsibilities and basis of report

As the charity's trustees of the Company (and also its directors for the purposes of company law) you are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006 ('the 2006 Act').

Having satisfied myself that the accounts of the Company are not required to be audited under Part 16 of the 2006 Act and are eligible for independent examination, I report in respect of my examination of your charity's accounts as carried out under section 145 of the Charities Act 2011 ('the 2011 Act'). In carrying out my examination I have followed the Directions given by the Charity Commission under section 145(5)(b) of the 2011 Act.

Independent examiner's statement

1 Accounting policies

Summary of significant accounting policies and key accounting estimates

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

Statement of compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice (applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)) (issued in October 2019) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Basis of preparation

Nottinghamshire Building Preservation Trust Limited meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

The trustees assess whether the use of going concern is appropriate i.e. whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the charity to continue as a going concern. The trustees make this assessment in respect of a period of one year from the date of approval of the financial statements.

Exemption from preparing a cash flow statement

The charity opted to early adopt Bulletin 1 published on 2 February 2016 and have therefore not included a cash flow statement in these financial statements.

Income and endowments

Voluntary income including donations, gifts, legacies and grants that provide core funding or are of a general nature is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Donations and legacies

Donations are recognised when the charity has been notified in writing of both the amount and settlement date. In the event that a donation is subject to conditions that require a level of performance by the charity before the charity is entitled to the funds, the income is deferred and not recognised until either those conditions are fully met, or the fulfilment of those conditions is wholly within the control of the charity and it is probable that these conditions will be fulfilled in the reporting period.

Investment income

Interest is included when receivable by the charity.

Expenditure

All expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to that expenditure, it is probable settlement is required and the amount can be measured reliably. All costs are allocated to the applicable expenditure heading that aggregate similar costs to that category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of resources, with central staff costs allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use. Other support costs are allocated based on the spread of staff costs.

Charitable activities

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Taxation

The charity is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

Depreciation and amortisation

Depreciation is provided on tangible fixed assets so as to write off the cost or valuation, less any estimated residual value, over their expected useful economic life as follows:

Trade debtors

Trade debtors are amounts due from customers for merchandise sold or services performed in the ordinary course of business.

Trade debtors are recognised initially at the transaction price. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less provision for impairment. A provision for the impairment of trade debtors is established when there is objective evidence that the charity will not be able to collect all amounts due according to the original terms of the receivables.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and call deposits, and other short-term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to a known amount of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

Fund structure

Unrestricted income funds are general funds that are available for use at the trustees' discretion in furtherance of the objectives of the charity.

Restricted income funds are those grants for use in a particular area or for specific purposes, the use of which is restricted to that area or purpose.

Graham Beaumont – a tribute



GRAHAM BEAUMONT (1936 - 2022)

"We have lost one of the best historians and trusty member of the NBPT. As a fellow architect I was able to learn much from Graham about those vernacular buildings that abound in this county. His contribution to the work of the NBPT was immense and some of this is featured in this article. There is much more in the Newsletters and Annual Reports that exist on the NBPT website at www.nbpt.co.uk. Graham was listed as a subscriber to the NBPT in the Annual Report of 1974-75, and first included as a technical adviser in the 10th Annual Report of 1976-77. He was involved for many years after, until ill-health forced him to take a back seat from the work he most enjoyed. One story that I recall as an example of Graham's commitment to the cause was when we got wind of Mansfield DC's proposal to demolish the Watson Fothergill designed Market Tavern in Mansfield. It was just coming up to a quiet period one Christmas. The tavern was obviously an inconvenience and in the way of the proposed new Water Meadows Swimming Pool. Between us we put together a rapid listed building spot-listing application which Graham personally took down to London to get registered and approved in quick time. Significantly, the spot-listing application was accepted by the then Environment Agency, the Market Tavern was saved from demolition, Christmas was celebrated with no dramas, the Water Meadows building was moved slightly on the site and everyone was happy!"

"Many of you will remember Graham as one of Nottinghamshire's leading historic buildings experts. His long career included 28 years working at the county council, during which time he advised literally thousands of owners of historic buildings, from Lords and Ladies in our grandest houses, to local village smithies with 12 foot tall horseshoe piles! He became an undoubted authority on historic buildings of all types and ages and passed this expertise on to the benefit of the many different official bodies and local interest groups that he was a part of. His career was interwoven with the creation, and the many great successes, of the Nottinghamshire Building Preservation Trust. Graham was instrumental in the rescue of numerous wonderful local buildings from the bulldozers. When not giving friendly advice to owners and those dealing with historic buildings, he would be found at one of many venues around the region giving talks on the subject, and as anyone who has attended his talks and lectures will testify, his ability to enthuse others

with his passion is his greatest talent. Graham retired from Nottinghamshire County Council on 8th November 2001, but didn't actually slow down for many years after, his assistance and association with NBPT's continuing until his ill health and death".

"Graham Beaumont, who died recently at the age of eighty five, was one of Reepham's characters. With his Father Christmas white beard, overalls and wheelbarrow he could be seen walking off to the allotments to tend his meticulously cared for plot. Behind that exterior was a truly talented individual. He was born in Colston Bassett, Nottinghamshire in 1936, a village famous for its cheese, a fact of which Graham was very proud. So much so that if he saw Colston Bassett cheese for sale in a supermarket he would tell the assistants where he came from and that his grandfather was one of the original shareholders, much to the embarrassment of his family. After the village school he won a scholarship to Nottingham Boys High School where it was suggested that he might aim to be an architect. Graham never hurried anything. To him perfection was his guiding light and not surprisingly his part time study to qualify to be a member of RIBA took twenty years. However during that time he gained experience and eventually he settled at Nottingham County Council as Head of Conservation where he stayed until his retirement. Graham had an amazing skill in recording old timber framed buildings by detailed measurement and beautiful scale drawings. As a result Notts have the best archive of this type of record in the country. This fascination with old building even extended to family beach holidays where sandcastles were Motte and Bailey complete with raised keep, palisade, moat and teaming courtyards! This prompted one passing child to ask their dad to do the same to which came the reply "Son, we haven't got a spade big enough".

Besides drawing Graham made excellent scale models of his buildings and outside work he was an active member of the Nottinghamshire Building Preservation Trust. But not just timber framed buildings took his attention he also managed to preserve the old red telephone boxes by getting them listed. Graham's thirst for knowledge was shared through his adult education lectures which were lavishly illustrated with slides and for which he developed a strong following of repeat attendees. He gave talks on a variety of topics including cathedrals, windmills, vernacular architecture, pub signs, butterflies - all in an unhurried, engaging style. Indeed at one of these talks he met his future wife Barbara.

"Within the village Graham was particularly active as a churchwarden for fifteen years. During this time we undertook the reordering of the church which, besides money, required expert knowledge to complete the copious paperwork needed to satisfy the Diocese that Reepham church was not run by cowboys. To have Graham, a conservation architect, was truly a heaven sent present. He dealt meticulously with all the detail, understood all the building regulations, had contacts with other experienced architects so that we could ensure the plans covered all the necessary hurdles. Put simply if it were not for Graham we would not be sitting in a comfortable, warm, well lit building which is being used more frequently as a community resource. Graham had a wonderful singing voice too which he used to great effect in hymns like "Guide Me O Thou Great Redeemer" and was a keen member of the church singing group. Aside from church Graham was busy on the allotments where everything was laid out using a fold up yardstick, meticulous to the last. Very much a traditional gardener: the plot was double dug and manured each year and you could tell when it was time to plant a particular crop as Graham would be on to it.

Eccentric perhaps, but he was also humble, courteous, kind, reliable, a true friend".

These notes are based on his funeral eulogy for which we thank his family and our memories of Graham.

Harry Johnson Award Results 2022 - The judges observations on the three winning entries

Eight entries were offered for consideration in the conservation class of the revived Harry Johnson Award this year ranging geographically from Radcliffe on Trent in the south to Scrooby in the north. The judges wish to thank all the sponsors, owners and designers for the variety of entries. Sadly the judges could only consider the external appearance and the quality of the workmanship although invitations to view the interiors were appreciated.

The buildings have a time span between early 16c and the 20c, some with many changes of use on the way. This has been a challenge for some designers who have had to select an appropriate period for the restoration. All the vision, work and dedication has resulted in fascinating historically interesting buildings all worthy of an award. NBPT and CPRE thank the owners, sponsors and designers for the pleasure it has given the judges to visit them all.

Nevertheless, the Chairman and former Chair of NBPT had a hard time making a final selection and missed the input of the co-sponsors of the Award CPRE, for which we have compensated with a weighting for 'Community Benefit'.

The Judges decided, after long discussion, that this year's winner of the Conservation Class should be Auld Cottage, Main Street, Norwell. and that Certificates of Commendation be given to Old School, School Lane Norwell and The Chapel, Chapel Lane, Scrooby.

Auld Cottage, Main St. Norwell. NG23 6JN WINNER

An early 16c building at risk of collapse has been skilfully conserved and converted to a 2 bed holiday let by its owners following a feasibility study by architect Jane Holt. A team of volunteers and skilled craftspeople, using traditional materials and methods, lime mortar, Yorkshire sliding sashes, relocating barn doors and reclaimed oak lintels. A very convincing and attractive 19c time slot, retaining the historic street scene.

The Old School, School Lane, Norwell. NG23 6JP COMMENDED

The Judges enjoyed the appearance of the 19c brick and stone church school and the imaginative conversion of the interior which had enabled the exterior to remain unchanged, down to the children's painted wall game target rings and the scout notice board in the porch. New aluminium double glazing in the window openings retains the original appearance. Good lime pointing where necessary.

The Chapel, Chapel Lane, Scrooby. DN10 6AE COMMENDED

The only Listed Building among the entries and therefore worthy of retention and restoration when no longer required for worship by the Methodist Church in 2009. A time slot of 1906 was chosen based on the earliest known photograph. The porch has been remodelled and the front windows have cills lowered by one glazing light which, in the judges' view, has reduced the austerity of the building.

Lime based external render and period railings and gates has returned the building to its former glory in a village which is like a time capsule itself.
